Through studying prominent national and international artists, pupils will learn how art and design both reflect and shape our history, and contribute to the culture, creativity and wealth of our nation.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Implement</li> <li>Kapow scheme</li> <li>Scheme of work is designed with five strands that run throughout. These are:  <ul> <li>Generating ideas</li> <li>Using sketchbooks</li> <li>Making skills, including formal elements (line, shape, tone, texture, pattern, colour)</li> <li>Knowledge of artists</li> <li>Evaluating and analysing</li> <li>Units of lessons are sequential, allowing children to build their skills and knowledge, applying them to a range of outcomes.</li> <li>The formal elements, a key part of the National Curriculum, are also woven throughout units.</li> <li>Key skills are revisited again and again with increasing complexity in a spiral curriculum model. - Collaborative atmosphere where students can share ideas, work together on projects, and learn from one another. By incorporating group projects, public exhibitions, and community art initiatives, students will develop a sense of belonging and understand the value of contributing to a greater whole. This aspect of the curriculum emphasises the importance of teamwork and the strength that comes from community engagement.
- Express empathy and understanding through their art. By exploring social issues, personal narratives, and the experiences of others, students will learn to articulate their thoughts and feelings while appreciating the diverse backgrounds and stories of their peers. Workshops on storytelling through visual arts, as well as projects focused on social justice themes, will challenge students to reflect on their role in promoting compassion within their community.
- Empowering students to take creative risks and express their unique voices. Through supportive feedback and a safe space for experimentation, students will be encouraged to confront their fears and push boundaries in their artistic pursuits. The curriculum will include opportunities for students to present their work publicly, fostering resilience and self-confidence as they navigate the often-challenging journey of artistic expression.
